#### 18 Tiny Deaths by Bruce Goldfarb

Frances Glessner Lee, born to a wealthy Chicago family in the 1870s, developed a fascination with the investigation of violent crimes and made it her life's work. She created the Nutshell Studies of Unexplained Death, a series of dioramas that appear charming - until you notice the macabre details. She later developed a system that used the dioramas to train law enforcement officers to investigate violent crimes – methods that are still used today.

# The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian by Sherman Alexie

Junior is a budding cartoonist growing up on the Spokane Indian Reservation. Determined to take his future into his own hands, he leaves his troubled school on the rez to attend an all-white farm town high school where the only other Indian is the school mascot.

#### The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho

The mystical story of a shepherd boy who yearns to travel in search of a worldly treasure, but his quest will lead him to riches far different than he ever imagined.

# All the Light We Cannot See by Anthony Doerr

A stunningly ambitious and beautiful novel about a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II.

#### Alone by Megan E. Freeman

When twelve-year-old Maddie hatches a scheme for a secret sleepover with her two best friends, she ends up waking up to a nightmare. She's alone—left behind in a town that has been mysteriously evacuated and abandoned. With no one to rely on, no power, and no working phone lines or internet access, Maddie slowly learns to survive on her own. Her only companions are a Rottweiler named George and all the books she can carry.



#### American Born Chinese by Gene Luen Yang

This graphic novel tells the story of three characters: Jin Wang, who discovers that he's the only Chinese-American student at his new school; the Monkey King, subject of one of the oldest Chinese fables; and Chin-Kee, a personification of the ultimate negative Chinese stereotype, who is ruining his cousin Danny's life with his yearly visits. Their lives and stories come together with an unexpected twist in this action-packed modern fable.

#### And Then There Were None by Agatha Christie

First, there were ten—an assortment of strangers summoned as guests to a private island off the coast of Devon. All that the guests have in common is a wicked past they're unwilling to reveal--and a secret that will seal their fate. For each has been marked for murder. One by one they fall prey. Before the weekend is out, there will be none.

# Hattie Big Sky by Kirby Larson

#### Homer & Langley by E.L. Doctorow

Homer and Langley Collyer are brothers - one blind and deeply intuitive, the other damaged into madness by mustard gas in the Great War. They live as recluses in their once grand Fifth Avenue mansion. Even though they want nothing more than to shut out the world, history seems to pass through their house in the persons of immigrants, prostitutes, society women, government agents, gangsters, jazz musicians . . . and their housebound lives are fraught with peril as they struggle to survive and create meaning for themselves.

# The House in the Cerulean Sea by T.J. Klune

Linus Baker leads a quiet, solitary life. At forty, he lives in a tiny house with a devious cat and his old records. As a Case Worker at the Department in Charge of Magical Youth, he spends his days overseeing the well-being of children in government-sanctioned orphanages.

# I Am Malala by Malala Yousafzai

For this, she was shot in the head while riding the bus home from school and few expected her to survive. Instead, her recovery has taken her from Pakistan to the halls of the United Nations, and at sixteen, she become a global symbol of peaceful protest and the youngest nominee ever for the Nobel Peace Prize.



#### I Found You by Lisa Jewell

East Yorkshire. Alice Lake finds a man on the beach outside her house. He has no name, no jacket, no idea what he is doing there. Surrey. Lily Monrose has only been married for three weeks. When her new husband fails to come home one night, she is left stranded in a new country where she knows no one. Then the police tell her that her husband never existed.

# I'll Be Gone in the Dark by Michell McNamara

# The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot

Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as HeLa. She was a poor black tobacco farmer whose cells--taken without her knowledge in 1951--became one of the most important tools in medicine. A riveting story of the collision between ethics, race, and medicine; of scientific discovery and faith healing; and of a daughter consumed with questions about the mother she never knew.

# In the Woods by Tana French

As dusk approaches a Dublin suburb, mothers begin to call their children home from the nearby woods. But this evening, three children do not return. Barry Laverty is the proud owner of a spanking new medical degree and little else. He jumps at the chance to secure a position as an assistant in a small rural practice - at least until he meets Dr. Fingal Flahertie O'Reilly, who has his own way of doing things. Through O'Reilly, Barry gets to know all of the village's colorful residents who make every day an education for the young doctor. With pluck and compassion and only the slightest touch of blarney, he will find out more about life—and love—than he ever imagined back in medical school.

#### Iron Lake by William Kent Krueger

Part Irish, part Anishinaabe Indian, Corcoran "Cork" O'Connor is the former sheriff of Aurora, Minnesota. Embittered by his "former" status, Cork gets by on heavy doses of caffeine, nicotine, and guilt. Once a cop on Chicago's South Side, there's not much that can shock him. Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a man who was sentenced to die for a murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinksmanship-- and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever.

# The Keeper of Lost Things by Ruth Hogan

Anthony Peardew is the keeper of lost things. Forty years ago, he carelessly lost a keepsake from his beloved fiancée, Therese. That very same day, she died unexpectedly. Brokenhearted, Anthony sought consolation in rescuing lost objects—the things others have dropped, misplaced or accidentally left behind— and writing stories about them. Now, in the twilight of his life, Anthony worries that he has not fully discharged his duty to reconcile all the lost things with their owners. As the end nears, he bequeaths his life's mission to his assistant, Laura, leaving her his house and all its lost treasures, including an irritable ghost.



#### Killers of the Flower Moon by David Gran

In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles and sent their children to study in Europe. Then, one by one, they began to be killed off. As the death toll passed twentyfour, the newly created F.B.I. took up the case. The young director, J. Edgar Hoover, turned to a former Texas Ranger named Tom White to try to unravel the mystery. White put together an undercover team and together with the Osage they began to expose one of the most sinister conspiracies in American history.

# The Kitchen House by Kathleen Grissom

Orphaned during her passage from Ireland, Lavinia arrives on the steps of the kitchen house at a plantation in Virginia, and is placed as an indentured servant under the care of Belle, the master's illegitimate slave daughter. In time, Lavinia is accepted into the big house, caring for the master's opium-addicted wife and befriending his dangerous yet protective son. She attempts to straddle the worlds of the kitchen and big house, but her skin color sets her apart from Belle and the other slaves.

# The Language of Flowers by Vanessa Diffenbaugh

The Victorian language of flowers was used to convey romantic expressions, but for Victoria Jones, it's been more useful in communicating grief, mistrust, and solitude. After a childhood spent in the foster-care system, she is unable to get close to anybody, and her only connection to the world is through flowers and their meanings. When a local florist discovers her talents, Victoria realizes she has a gift for helping others through the flowers she chooses for them.

# Letters from Skye by Jessica Brockmole

March 1912: Elspeth Dunn, a published poet and a fisherman's wife, has never seen the world beyond her home on the Isle of Skye. So she is astonished when a fan letter arrives from an American college student, David Graham. They strike up a correspondence that blossoms into love. June 1940: After a nearby bomb rocks



Elspeth's house, and hidden letters are released from their hiding place, Elspeth disappears. Only a single letter remains as a clue to her whereabouts...

# The Life We Bury by Allen Eskens

College student Joe Talbert has the modest goal of completing a writing assignment for an English class. His task is to interview a stranger and write a brief biography of the person. With deadlines looming, Joe heads to a nearby nursing home to find a willing subject. There he meets Carl Iverson, and soon nothing in Joe's life is ever the same.

#### The Light Between Oceans by M.L. Stedman

After WW1, Tom Sherbourne returns to Australia and takes a job as the lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock. He brings his wife, Isabel, who, years later, hears a baby's cries on the wind. A boat has washed up onshore carrying a dead man and a living baby. Tom wants to report them immediately, but Isabel has taken the baby to her breast. Against Tom's judgment, they claim her as their own. When she is two, they return to the mainland and are reminded that there are other people in the world and their choice has devastated one of them.

#### *Little Bones* by N.V. Peacock

My father was Mr. Bones—the notorious serial killer 25 years ago. As a child I witnessed his crimes. Everything is different now. I have a new identity. I'm a mother. I'm finally free. Until the podcast.

# The Little French Bistro by Nina George

Marianne is stuck in a loveless, unhappy marriage. After forty-one years, she has reached her limit, and one evening in Paris she decides to act. Following a dramatic moment on the banks of the Seine, Marianne leaves her life behind and sets out for the coast of Brittany where she learns it's never too late to begin the search for what life should have been all along.

# The Little Old Lady Who Broke All the Rules by C. Ingelman-Sundberg

Martha may be 79 years old and live in a retirement home, but that doesn't mean she's ready to stop enjoying life. When the management of Diamond House starts



cutting corners to save money, Martha and her four closest friends won't stand for it. Their solution? White-collar crime. What begins as a relatively straightforward robbery of a nearby hotel escalates into an unsolvable heist at the National Museum.

# Locally Laid by Lucie B. Amundsen

How a Midwestern family with no agriculture experience went from a few backyard chickens to a full-fledged farm--and discovered why local chicks are better.

# The Long-shining Waters by Danielle Sosin

Lake Superior, the north country, the great fresh-water expanse. Frigid. Lethal. Wildly beautiful. Here are three stories whose characters are separated by centuries and circumstance, yet connected across time by a shared geography.

# A Long Way Home by Saroo Brierley

At five years old, Saroo Brierley got lost on a train in India. Unable to read, write, or recall his own last name, he survived for weeks on the streets of Calcutta before being transferred to an agency and adopted by a couple in Australia. Despite his gratitude, the author wondered about his origins; one day, after years of searching, he found what he was looking for and sets off to find his family.

# Maisie Dobbs by Jacqueline Winspear

Maisie Dobbs, Psychologist and Investigator, began her working life as a servant in a Belgravia mansion, only to be discovered reading in the library by her employer. Fearing dismissal, she is shocked when her thirst for education is supported by her employer and a family friend, Dr. Maurice Blanche. Years later, having apprenticed to Dr. Blanche, Maisie sets up her own business. Her first assignment, a seemingly tedious inquiry involving a case of suspected infidelity, takes her not only on the trail of a killer, but back to the war she had tried so hard to forget.

# A Man Called Ove by Fredrik Backman

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon; the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. Behind the cranky



exterior there is a story and a sadness. One morning a couple with two daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox. It is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul.

#### The Martian by Andy Weir

Astronaut Mark Watney became one of the first people to walk on Mars. Now, he's sure he'll be the first person to die there. After a dust storm nearly kills him and forces his crew to evacuate while thinking him dead, Mark finds himself stranded and completely alone with no way to even signal Earth that he's alive.

# The Ministry of Utmost Happiness by Arundhati Roy

A braided narrative of force and originality, The Ministry of Utmost Happiness is at once a love story and a provocation. Its heroes, both present and departed, have been broken by the world we live in - and then mended by love. For this reason, they will never surrender.

#### Miss Benson's Beetle by Rachel Joyce

In 1950, London is still reeling from WW II and Margery Benson is trying to get through life, surviving on scraps. One day, she quits her job to set out on an expedition in search of an insect that may or may not exist--the golden beetle of New Caledonia. When she advertises for an assistant, she ends up with fun-loving Enid Pretty, who seems to attract trouble wherever she goes. Together they are drawn into an adventure that exceeds all expectations and delivers something neither of them expected: the transformative power of friendship.

# The Museum of Extraordinary Things by Alice Hoffman

The story of an electric and impassioned love between two vastly different souls in New York during the volatile first decades of the twentieth century.

# My Brilliant Friend by Elena Ferrante

A rich, intense and generous-hearted story about two friends, Elena and Lila, that is also the story of a nation and a touching meditation on the nature of friendship.



# My Dark Vanessa by Kate Elizabeth Russell

Exploring the psychological dynamics and trauma of the relationship between a teenage student and her teacher.

#### My Sister, the Serial Killer by Oyinkan Braithwaite

When Korede's dinner is interrupted one night by a distress call from her sister, Ayoola, she knows what's expected of her: bleach, rubber gloves, nerves of steel and a strong stomach. #### The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander

Law professor Alexander argues that the War on Drugs and policies that deny convicted felons' equal access to employment, housing, education, and public benefits create a permanent under caste based largely on race.

#### News of the World by Paulette Jiles

In the aftermath of the Civil War, an itinerant news reader agrees to transport a young captive of the Kiowa back to her people in this exquisitely rendered, morally complex novel that explores the boundaries of family, responsibility, honor, and trust.

# The Nickel Boys by Colson Whitehead

Elwood Curtis has taken the words of Dr Martin Luther King to heart: he is as good as anyone. AbandoOned by his parents, brought up by his loving grandmother, Elwood is about to enroll in the local black college. Btu one innocent mistake is enough to destroy his future, and so Elwood arrives at The Nickel Academy, which claims to provide 'physical, intellectual, and moral training' which will equip its inmates to become 'honorable and honest men.' In reality, The Nickel Academy is a chamber of horrors.

#### The Nightingale by Kristin Hannah

Viann and Isabelle have always been close despite their differences. Younger, bolder sister Isabelle lives in Paris, while Viann lives in the French countryside



with her husband and daughter. Then World War II strikes and as the war progresses, it's not only the sisters' relationship that is tested, but their individual senses of right and wrong.

# The No. 1 Ladies Detective Agency by Alexander McCall Smith

Precious Ramotswe has opened Botswana's first and only detective agency staffed by women.

#### Normal People by Sally Rooney

Connell and Marianne grew up in the same small town, but the similarities end there. At school, Connell is popular and well liked, while Marianne is a loner. But when the two strike up a conversation—awkward but electrifying—something life changing begins. A story of mutual fascination, friendship and love, Normal People takes us from that first conversation to the years beyond, in the company of two people who try to stay apart but find that they can't.

#### The Orchardist by Amanda Coplin

In search of answers, Snowman embarks on a journey through the lush wilderness that was so recently a great city, until powerful corporations took mankind on an uncontrolled genetic engineering ride.

#### Pachinko by Min Jin Lee

In this page-turning saga, four generations of a poor Korean immigrant family fight to control their destiny in 20th-century Japan, exiled from a home they never knew.

# People We Meet on Vacation by Emily Henry

Poppy and Alex. Alex and Poppy. They have nothing in common, and somehow, they are the very best of friends. Until two years ago, when they ruined everything. They haven't spoken since.

# Picture of Dorian Grey by Oscar Wilde

Dorian Gray, a remarkably handsome young man, meets Lord Henry Wotton and is corrupted into a life of terrible evil that is reflected only in his portrait.

#### Please See Us by Caitlin Mullen

Summer has come to Atlantic City, but the boardwalk is empty of tourists, the casino lights have dimmed, and two Jane Does are laid out in the marshland behind the Sunset Motel, just west of town. Clara, a boardwalk psychic, struggles to attract clients when she begins to experience disturbing visions that she suspects are related to the recent cases of missing women.

#### The Power by Naomi Alderman

When a new force takes hold of the world, people from different areas of life are forced to cross paths in an alternate reality that gives women and teenage girls immense physical power that can cause pain and death.

He lives alone, his bookstore is experiencing the worst sales in its history, and now his prized possession, a rare collection of Poe poems, has been stolen. But when a mysterious package appears at the bookstore, its unexpected arrival gives Fikry the chance to make his life over--and see everything anew.

#### The Sugar Queen by Sarah Addison Allen

Josey Cirrini is sure of three things: winter is her favorite season, she's a sorry excuse for a Southern belle, and sweets are best eaten in the privacy of her closet. Josey has settled into an uneventful life in her mother's house, until she finds her closet harboring Della Lee Baker, a local waitress who is one part nemesis--and two parts fairy godmother. With Della Lee's tough love, Josey's narrow existence quickly expands.



#### The Tale of Despereaux by Kate DiCamillo

The adventures of Despereaux Tilling, a small mouse of unusual talents, the princess that he loves, the servant girl who longs to be a princess, and a devious rat determined to bring them all to ruin.

#### The Taxidermist's Daughter by Kate Mosse

Sussex, 1912. Residents gather in a misty churchyard. It is St. Mark's Eve, the night when the ghosts of those fated to die in the coming year are said to materialize. Standing alone is Constantia Gifford, the taxidermist's daughter. As the last peal of the midnight bell fades, a woman is found dead. Who is the victim, and why has her death affected Connie so deeply? Why is she watched by a mysterious figure who has suddenly appeared? A novel that follows 12 people from Native communities who are traveling to the Big Oakland Powwow. Among them is Jacquie Red Feather, newly sober and trying to make it back to her family; Dene Oxendene, pulling his life together after his uncle's death; and fourteen-year-old Orvil, coming to perform for the first time. Together, they tell of the plight of the urban Native American--grappling with a complex and painful history, with an inheritance of beauty and spirituality, with communion and sacrifice and heroism.

# They Did It with Love by Kate Morgenroth

Sofie and her husband have left Manhattan in search of a more tranquil life in the suburbs. But when a member of Sofie's new neighborhood book club turns up dead, things get messy. She discovers that everybody has something to hide, including her own husband.



# A Tree Grows in Brooklyn by Betty Smith

A young girl in a shabby neighborhood lives with dreams of an innocent time before the war.

#### Tuck Everlasting by Natalie Babbitt

A family accidentally stumbles upon a spring with water endowing them with the gift of eternal life. Seventy years later, without having grown a day older, a young girl discovers them and learns their secret.

#### Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead

Cora is a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia. When Caesar, a recent arrival, tells her about the Underground Railroad, they decide to escape. Though they manage to find a station and head north, they are being hunted. Their first stop is South Carolina, in a city that initially seems like a haven. But the city's placid surface masks an insidious scheme designed for its black denizens.

#### The Vanishing by Wendy Webb

Recently widowed and rendered penniless by her husband, Julia Bishop is eager to start anew. So when a stranger appears on her doorstep with a job offer, she finds herself accepting the position: caretaker to his mother, Amaris Sinclair, the famous horror novelist whom Julia has always admired and who the world believes is dead. At the age of thirty-six, Paul Kalanithi was diagnosed with stage IV lung cancer. One day he was a doctor treating the dying, and the next he was a patient struggling to live. When Breath Becomes Air chronicles his transformation from a



medical student into a neurosurgeon at Stanford, and finally into a patient and new father confronting his own mortality.

#### Where'd You Go, Bernadette by Maria Semple

To her husband, Bernadette is a fearlessly opinionated partner; to fellow privateschool mothers in Seattle, she's a disgrace; to design mavens, she's a revolutionary architect; and to 15-year-old Bee, she's a best friend and, simply, Mom. Bee has aced her report card and claimed her reward: a family trip to Antarctica. For Bernadette, who has become increasingly agoraphobic, such a trip is problematic. Then Bernadette disappears.

# Wild: From Lost to Found on the Pacific Crest Trail by Cheryl Strayed

At twenty-two, Cheryl Strayed thought she had lost everything – her mother, her family and her marriage. Four years later, with nothing to lose, she made the most impulsive decision of her life. With no experience or training, she would hike more than a thousand miles of the Pacific Crest Trail from the Mojave Desert through California and Oregon to Washington State--and she would do it alone.

# Will to Murder: The True Story Behind the Crimes & Trials Surrounding the Glensheen Murders by Gail Feichtinger

All passengers remain accounted for, so, the ship sails on as if nothing has happened, despite Lo's desperate attempts to convey that something (or someone) has gone wrong.

#### Wonder by R.J. Palacio

August Pullman was born with a facial difference that, up until now, has prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Starting 5th grade at Beecher Prep, he wants nothing more than to be treated as an ordinary kid--but his new classmates can't get past Auggie's extraordinary face.

#### Writers & Lovers by Lily King

Blindsided by her mother's death and wrecked by a recent love affair, Casey Peabody moves to Massachusetts without a plan. At thirty-one, she is still clutching onto something all her friends have let go of: the determination to live a creative life. When she falls for two very different men, her world fractures even more. Casey's fight to fulfil her creative ambitions and balance the demands of art and life is challenged in ways that push her to the brink.



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
